





History A level includes three elements, two of which prepare for written examinations and one lead to the independent production of a 'non examined assessment' piece of writing. The topics studied all draw on the foundation of historical knowledge and understanding established in years 7 to 11: 'Stuart Britain' leads directly on from the Elizabethan England unit at GCSE as well as drawing on knowledge from year 8; the 'Cold War' overlaps and extends the Conflict and Tension and USA units of GCSE and the 'NEA' focus on the causes of the Russian Revolution retrieves knowledge acquired in year 9 and again at GCSE. Different Brain in Gear activities are utilised to retrieve existing knowledge, revisit skills and introduce new topics and ideas, with the existing historical skills already acquired further developed and refined to meet the standard required at A level.
