



How you can help your son / daughter in: ***Economics***

**Help them to be organised:**

All content is available via the google classroom for this year and last year. Every element within each topic must be revised. They can use a tick list and make it part of their revision timetable. Student's folders should contain their notes and lesson resources which will help them to gain a greater depth of understanding of each topic.

If students are missing lesson resources or note sheets these can be obtained from the Economics Google Classrooms which all students have access to. Students may want to use this for recapping and revising content from Year 12.

**Get them kitted out:**

Textbooks for both Year 1 and Year 2 topics can be purchased online (All available on amazon. Search AQA A-Level textbook) or and there is now a single textbook covering all topics. There are a whole array of revision guides which can be purchased from most bookshops and online which are really useful. However, they are limited to some extent in terms of the level of detail they contain and therefore should only be used to supplement their other resources.

**Guide them online:**

There are some very useful websites that cover many of the topics in the A Level specification. Tutor2U is a very useful site, which has good notes on key topics and helpful revision resources. YouTube also has some useful videos, which will help develop an understanding of some key topics and provide an alternative method of understanding content.

**Help them prepare:**

There is a huge amount of material covered in the three examination papers, so developing techniques and producing personalised resources to remember the content is crucial: flash cards, mind maps, grids, tables, question and answer cards are all useful ways to learn the material.

However, students need to be able to apply this knowledge to the exam questions, so completing as many past papers as possible against the clock, is by far the best way to prepare. By doing this students become very familiar with the various types of question, and much less likely to encounter a question they don't understand in the final exam
