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## Paper 1 revision ideas:

- Read a range of non-fiction texts, particularly the feature articles or editorials and opinion pieces, which express clear viewpoints – try some of the major news websites.

Students must write about the character or theme in the extract, before linking it to the rest of the text.



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# Exam Paper 1: Shakespeare and 19th Century Novel

**Section B: 19th Century Novel (50 mins)** 

30 marks available

Students will answer on A Christmas Carol.

Students will be given an extract as a start point, before linking a specified character or theme to the rest of the novel.



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# Exam Paper 2: Modern Drama Text, Power and Conflict Poetry and Unseen Poetry

Students will answer essay based questions on set texts:

Section B: JB Priestley's An Inspector Calls (50 mins)

30 marks available + 4 SPAG marks

Closed text exam

Students will write an essay based on a character or theme, as specified in the question, but there is no extract provided.

The question will be more open and will require students to show knowledge and understanding across the whole text, without the support of an extract; however, there is a choice of question.



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# Exam Paper 2: Modern Drama Text, Power and Conflict Poetry and Unseen Poetry

Students will answer one essay based questions on one named poem printed on the paper and one other from the Power and Conflict anthology cluster.

(50 mins)

30 marks available + 4 SPAG marks



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### Exam Paper 2: Unseen Poetry

Section Bi: Unseen Poetry (30 mins)

24 marks available

Students will be asked to write an analysis of an unseen poem: they will be using the same skills as in the other questions, but as it is unstudied, they will not be expected to make contextual links.

Section Bii: Unseen Poetry Comparison (15 mins)

8 marks available

Students will then be asked to write a short comparison of Section Bi unseen poem with a second unseen poem, with a focus on writers' methods.

- Knowledge organisers
- Making cue cards which marry words, images and colours
- Turning chapters/poems/acts into images supported by quotation
- Creating question and answer cards
- Re-reading set texts
- Watching film versions of A Christmas Carol, An Inspector Calls and Macbeth and make notes
- Create summary sheets. Start off with 100 words, then go down to 50,30,10,5
- Reading exemplar answers and annotating them and rank ordering them for success
